Dr. A. B. Mackey Leads Fund -- Raising Campaign

Dr. Powers Gives Inspiring Messages

We were privileged to have for our annual Benson Lectures our senior general superintendent, Dr. Hardy C. Powers of Dallas, Texas.

Dr. Powers was for eighteen years a pastor and district leader. He took his ministerial training at Pasadena College, California. Later Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, conferred upon him the honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. Dr. Powers accepted his first pastorate at Cucamonga, California. In 1936 he was elected superintendent of the Iowa district and was elected general superintendent in 1944.

These messages were both inspiring and helpful for consistent Christian living. Dr. Powers spoke on the following themes: Monday's lecture was centered on "Andrew," Simon Peter's brother. The dominant thought was the "importance of basic training in Christian Life and Service." On the following day Dr. Powers spoke on "God's Spiritual Man." The thoughts were brought out that man is not spiritual just because he is willing to fight for his position; and emotional reactions do not necessarily make a spiritual man. The genius of the Church of the Nazarene has been to take men from all ranges of temperaments and put them in the place most needed. Dr. Powers designated the marks of the spiritual man as: (1) necessity of being born of the Spirit, (2) being filled with the Holy Spirit, (3) walking in the Spirit, (4) and the real mark is close scrutiny of our affections. Men suffer most at that point where their deepest affection lies. The next day Dr. Powers brought a message on "shattered ideas" which deeply stirred all of us. Speaking from the 32nd chapter of Jeremiah, he instructed us that we must turn our eyes upon Jesus for human ideals would fail. One striking thought was that "a man sees through the eyes of his character." What he is affects what he sees. On Thursday he inspired us with the

Trevecca Tomorrow

The growth of Trevecca Nazarene College depends upon the growth of the church and the growth of the church will depend upon the evangelistic fervor of the students who graduate from Trevecca in the tomorrows. The Church of the Nazarene in the Southeast has increased in number in the past twenty years as no other section in the United States. The membership is now two and one-half times what it was twenty years ago. At the same rate of increase, twenty years from now, we will have approximately 100,000 Nazarenes in Trevecca zone. If the enrollment of Trevecca College should increase during the next twenty years at the same rate it has in the past twenty, it should have 1,000 students. In the past twenty years the income has increased five times. If, in the next twenty years it should have the same rate of increase the annual income of Trevecca College will be \$1,000,000. If the college will keep up its evangelistic zeal and will grow, such a church will increase its support of the college and such predictions as are in this column may fall short of the real growth of Trevecca College. God has promised that He will do for us more than we ask or think. May we ask largely in behalf of Trevecca.

GLOBAL GLIMPSES

President Eisenhower is quite concerned about the economic situation of today here in our country. For several months people in every walk of life have been wondering whether to expect a depression. There have been several signs which cause one to feel and taste the probability of a depression. One main thing is that unemployment is considerably high right now.

Last week the President said if employment does not rise in March he will consider emergency steps to make sure the country does not drift into a depression. However, it is believed that a demand for workers should pick up then, but it may still be a critical month in the unemployment situation. At a new conference the President said that March should be a key month in determining whether the country actually is in a recession now since employment usually begins to pick up then.

Eisenhower stated that if things develop to the point that a major downturn appears likely he will not hesitate to use every single weapon available to the government to head it off. At the same time the President declared that he did not want to send the government on a wild course of action.

While the President spent a vacation in southern California, Democratic leaders of the Senate have been discussing the Jefferson-Jackson day dinner to be held in Miami, March 6. A trio of Democratic leaders, Senators Johnson, Clements and Russell, the real power behind the scenes, are secretly grooming their own candidate, Missouri's Stuart Symington, for the 1956 Presidential election.

Since Adlai Stevenson, head of the Democratic party, accepted an invitation to head the celebrity list at the dinner the trio seriously considered and debated whether they should attend. They have decided to attend the dinner and make the dinner a great show of unity in the party.

Although the 1956 election is quite a while from now the party is fervently planning now to come back in power then. At present, the party is concentrating on unity and is trying to make the party more powerful before announcing for certain whom they are going to support for the presidency.




"Robin, my wings are still singed!! I was flying around the campus February 3rd. and I ran into a fire.

Every-one was bustling around trying to get enough water poured on the cafeteria and dormitory to put out the flames. I was so flustered that I flew away thinking dear ole T. N. C. would all go up in smoke. I stayed away two or three days. I just couldn't get up the nerve to return. At last I did however and what do you suppose!! Life was going on as usual around here; everyone was in good spirits and following the usual routine!! Such students! You just can't get them down. They never lose their courage . . . In Public School music class the other day Professor Hammond asked everyone to hum—They all did. Then Winifred Halstead exclaimed, "My teeth are rattling." A friend came to his rescue the other day and sent him a box of pills called "fish finders." A pamphlet inside contained the following instructions:

After arriving at the place on the lake or river where you desire to fish; drop one Chemical Pellet in not less than six feet of water. Watch the spot for change in color; it sometimes takes as long as thirty minutes to change. If a blue spiral rises from the bottom caused by disintegration of the Chemical Pellet to water surface, the location selected should be a good place for Blue Catfish. Hurricanes 57 - 30


Extending their string of victories to six straight, the first place Sophomores romped over the High School five in Wednesday night's game, winning by a 57 to 30 score.
