hurt the faith of our boys in immortality and a hereafter. These blind guides will hurt their faith in the way of getting ready for this hereafter by their false teaching. The Devil knew he could not, by a war, damage the faith of the soldiers in a future state, when they faced the danger of meeting it every day. Hence, he got in his work with these teachers, and dared pollute their faith in the way of salvation by diverting them from the cross of Calvary to their own service and sacrifice on the field of battle.

Lost Heads

LL OUR readers have seen chickens that had lost their heads. They act very strangely when they lose their heads. Their actions are extremely uncertain. They flop about in all directions, scattering blood here and there. They flounder all around in this and that direction, with no orderliness in their movements. The most inconsistent movements for chickens are seen and the most surprising antics occur. You can never tell just where they will strike in the next flop and hence you are never surprised at any action by headless chickens.

It is a fact, however, that chickens are not alone in the matter of losing their heads. Strange as it may appear, preachers sometimes happen to this fate. We have often seen the spectacle and there is a resemblance between their actions and those of the chickens which have lost their heads. You can never tell just what action to look for from a headless preacher. Inconsistency is the most marked feature of the capers of headless preachers. Variations, contradictions, inconsistencies make up the lives of such clericals as have lost their heads. We are never surprised, as much as we may be disgusted, at things such preachers will say and do who lose their heads.

To illustrate our point, we refer to some vagaries which have been indulged in since this war by such clergymen as we here describe. Nothing whatever, except the fact of their having lost their heads, could account for these disgusting and contradictory and inconsistent things said by these gentry. Take the saying of one of these preachers that "no matter what the shortcomings of a-soldier may be, when he dies on the battle field in defense of his country he is entitled to all the benefits and blessings of heaven." Take another case where the preacher said that "for a soldier who thus died on the battle field defending the world's liberty, heaven was not pure enough for his residence." Such nonsense is credited to men called preach. ers of the gospel as contained in the infallibly inspired Bible. which teaches that there is none other name given among men whereby men can be saved, except the name of Christ,

Hear what Paul says in the thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians. He says, "Though I give my body to be burned. and have not charity [love], it profiteth me nothing." Here it is declared that even if in defense of my faith in Christ I should be required to lay my body down and have it burned to ashes, if I have not love shed abroad in my heart by the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven, it profits me nothing. Here is a supreme sacrifice of one's life for the sacredest of all causes. the maintenance of the faith of Christ; which, however, is bootless unless there is with it and accompanying it that love of God the apostle describes so eloquently in the chapter referred to.

Men professing to be called and commissioned ministers of our Lord Jesus Christ make themselves simpletons when they indulge in such glaring nonsense as to claim that soldiers on the field of battle, who make what they are pleased to term "the supreme sacrifice." are too pure to enter the heaven of the Bible. Laymen of ordinary common sense, whether Christians or not, generally disapprove such blasphemy as this.

No man living can have a tenderer appreciation of the noble army of heroes, who bare their breasts to the bullets of the German assassins, and are shot down by them to their death, than the writer. Let us ever honor these heroes and delight to revere their memory. But let us, while we are faithful in this praise and gratitude to these noble young men, keep our heads on our shoulders and remain decent and respectable and self-respecting. Let us not contradict the Bible and renounce the gospel, by the substitution of some other sacrifice than the one and only Sacrifice made for the sins of all men, by such twaddle as some preachers have been indulging in.

No man can save himself by anything he can do, however noble. Oliver Cromwell was never heard to make any such absurd claims as this set forth by these headless preachers. No other man of sanity and soundness will make the claim. The young men themselves know better and do not rest their hope on any such absurd and unscriptural basis. It is certainly fatiguing in the extreme to have to hear such nonsense, in the blazing light of this twentieth century of the Christian dispensation. Can not these headless preachers be interned in some way and save society from their unsavory and unsanitary association? There ought to be some way to protect an innocent public from contact with such a class of malodorous undesirables, as such so-called ministers of the gospel. They mislead men as far as as they have any influence left. They are traitors to the Bible and to the real gospel of the Son of God given to us in the all-sufficient and only Sacrifice of Christ Jesus our Lord.

Time fails us, as well as space, to include in this list the array of so-called "higher critics" who have been for fifty years engaged in discrediting the Bible by their learned nonsense. We have paid our respects to this class often enough for the reader to know exactly our estimate of it. It belongs to the same class as the headless crowd we have dealt with in this editorial. They are both headless alike, and need to be interned in some way for the protection of the public against their worse than nonsense, no matter under what names they may masquerade themselves.

IT IS BETTER to say too little than to say too much. This is true in crises as well as in the general run of life. It is easier to add to what was said that was right than it is to take back any part of the things said that were wrong. When it gets you on the wrong track the tongue likes to keep you going as long as it can influence you to keep up the wrong talk. Study to know when and where to put on the brake.

Jesus, the King of the Jews

"This is Jesus the King of the Jews" (Matt. 27: 37).

E ARE told, by St. John, that when the chief priests saw what was written over the head of Jesus, they said to Pilate, "Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, I am King of the Jews" (St. John 19:21). But Pilate said, "What I have written I have written" (v. 22). Pilate was convinced he was condemning a faultless man, and he had this testimony from the lips of the Christ himself. When asked regarding His Kingship and kingdom, Jesus said, "Sayest thou this thing of thyself, or did others tell it thee of me?" and "My kingdom is not of this world: if my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight, that I should not be delivered to the Jews: but now is my kingdom not from hence," and "Thou sayest that I am a king. To this end world, that I should bear witness unto the truth."

So we see that Jesus by no means disowned the title, possibly placed in partial derision above Him as He hung on the cross; but, on the opposite, tenaciously clung to the title, saying, in our modern way of saying it, "Yes, sir, I am. I am King of the Jews. Do unto me as they please, still I am the rightful King of the Jews."

When we speak of a king we immediately connect it with at least three other things, viz.: kingdom, subject, and government or law. Jesus told Pilate His kingdom was not of this world. St. Paul seems to get the same idea, when he tells the Roman Christians, "For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost." So we see from this that the kingdom Jesus speaks of is not a material kingdom, but a moral or spiritual kingdom. For material things are not subject to the states of joy, peace, or righteousness. When we say that man is "full of joy" we do not mean a part of his body; we mean his soul. For joy is a moral quality. Likewise are all the other fruits of the Spirit.

And of such a kingdom is Jesus King. "Not of this world." Jesus says this kingdom "cometh not by observation: . . for, behold, the kingdom of God is within you" (Luko 17:20, 21). Speaking to Nicodemus, Jesus said, "The wind bloweth where it listeth." and goes on to say, "So is every one that is born of the Spirit." Which backs up the truth of St. Luke, "Not with observation."

Again Jesus says, "Verily I say unto you, That there be some of you which stand here, which shall not taste of death, till they have seen the kingdom of God come with power" (Mark 9:1; also Matt. 16:28). It is a present obtainment. Glory be to God!

A kingdom does not need a king, and is of little consequence unless it has subjects, and subjects, too, who have power to obey or disobey the law. Now the Jews were God's subjects-descendants of Abraham, "children of promise," called out of Egypt, and finally landed in Canaan-those born under the covenant of circumcision. These were Jews-God's chosen spiritual people. St. Paul had an idea that there were some branded Jews who were not Jews. He says, "For he is not a Jew, which is one outwardly; neither is that circumcision, which is outward in the flesh: But he is a Jew, which is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the spirit. and not in the letter; whose praise is not of men, but of God" (Romans 2:28, 29). Again

he says, "Abraham had two sons, the one by a bondmaid, the other by a freewoman. . . . Nevertheless what saith the scripture? . . . the son of the bondwoman shall not be heir with the son of the freewoman. So then, brethren, we are not children of the bondwoman, but of the free" (Gal. 4:22, 30, 31).

Again he says, "If ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise" (Gal. 3:29). That makes us Jews! Although we were once "Gentiles in the flesh, . . . aliens from the commonwealth of Israel; yet by repentance and faith in the blood of the Son of God have we been reconciled to God." "Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellowcitizens with the saints, and of the household of God; And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone." Blessed be God forever and ever!

To be subjects we must obey law. One fundamental, essential principle, on which the kingdom of God stands, is the law of God. The law must be kept if we remain in His kingdom. Not in part, but in whole. James says, "He that offendeth in one point is guilty of all." If we remain a Jew, we must let the King of the Jews reign over us! When God arrested us by the Holy Ghost, and we repented, we there promised God to obey His

law. We gave up our "arms" and He gave us faith, love, joy, peace, and righteousness in the Holy Ghost. I remember that, don't you? How we did stand up for God! In battle after battle we came off more than conquerors, through Him who loved us. Glory be to God. How precious He was to us! How we loved Him! How loval we were to Him! We've said like Peter, "Although all men forsake thee, yet will not I, and I will lay downmy life for thy sake." We meant it, too!

The Book says, "He came unto his own, and his own received him not." Who were His own? The Jews. But they refused to receive Him as King. As long as Jesus showed His almighty power, escaping out of the hands of those who tried to take him, by raising the dead, healing the sick, and restoring sight to the blind, the crowds followed Him, and even tried to crown Him King; but whenever He began to manifest His kingship, "Many went back, and walked no more with him." The chief priests bought one of the twelve to betray Him unto them; and he "sought a convenient season," and betrayed Him unto them. When on trial before Pilate, when he asked what to do with the King of the Jews, they disowned Him as their King, and said they had no king but Cæsar, and they would not have Christ to rule over them. They then said, "Away with him," "Crucify him," "Release unto us Barabbas."

There is a time in every "Jew's" life when Jesus commences to exert His Kingship. That same Jesus is on trial today, just as much as He was when He stood before Pilate and said, "Ye say that I am."

Regenerated brother and sister, when you look at your thoughts, words, and deeds, in secret, public, and private, through God's soul mirror-the Word of God-don't you find somewhere and some time something that wasn't done to the glory of God? Are you still willing to go through for God? Are you still willing to die for Him, although all men forsake Him? Will you let Him cast out of His kingdom all things that offend? Jesus is waiting for an answer! What will you do with Jesus? Will you say with the Jews, "Away with him," "Crucify him," "We will not have him to rule over us," "Release Barabbas"-the murderer and robber, the "old man"? The question is up to you, What will I do with Jesus? You have proved that He is the Son of God! Take and judge Him according to your law! "It is not lawful for us to put any man to death." "I find no fault in him." What then will you do with your King?

The Jews said, "His blood be on us, and on our children." And their request to Pilate was answered in 70 A. D., when Titus captured the city; and we are told so great was the slaughter of the people the blood ran down the temple steps with the flow and rapidity of a large stream. They said they would not have this Man to rule over them. What are you saying? Are you willing to let Jesus cleanse your heart? Are you willing to continue a loyal and obedient subject of the poor, forsaken, despised, and rejected King of the Jews? Or are you willing to release Barabbas-a type of the "old man"-who took away your spiritual life before, and will rob you again of all you hold dear-love, joy, peace, and heaven? For your own sake, the sake of others, and above all, for Jesus' sake, have Jesus set at liberty and Barabbas destroyed; and prove the liberty wherewith Christ makes free; or else you will have to meet Him in judgment.

Why the American Church Is Apostatizing

CHRISTIAN is a Christed-one, or one who bears about in his life the vital, throbbing, warm, gentle life of the Christ. A church is a number of the Christedones who have banded themselves together to assist one another and bring others into the same relation to Jesus Christ. The only gateway into the Ohristed life is by way of the new birth. Man, by nature, is a religious being, and is so constituted that he will worship some object or objects. As soon as the child reaches the age of accountability he steps out from under the merits of the atonement into sin; unless he has been saved previous to or at the time of accountability. And since the child is born with the sin principle in his heart, he early becomes a lover of sin and the world. Then he becomes an idolater, with the world as his idol. This religious idolater is visited by the Holy Ghost, who shows him his moral degradation, and, as a consequence. he seeks admittance into the visible church that he may receive its moral benefits. Under conviction he may shed a few tears over his moral condition, but refuse to relinquish his hold on his idol and abandon all sin. However, he does "intellectually" accept Jesus as the true model of life; although he refuses to release his grasp on his sinful idol, and allow his life to be conformed to the new Model he has accepted. On the strength of this intellectual profession he could gain entrance into the membership of almost any of the American churches, even though he is-still an idolater with no change of heart, and his affections yet set on the world.

By nature man becomes more and more conformed to the object of his worship and influences all with whom he comes in contact to seek the level of his own thinking and worship, which results in this idolatrous worldling injecting into his church life the element of the world in which he lives. This not only reacts on the man, bringing him to lower ideals and lowering the level of his own expectation relative to the standard he has set for his morals, but also attracts to his companionship as worshipers other worldlings who, by nature, must worship. Those thus attracted do not become worshipers of the true and living God, but do worship the form. ceremony, stained glass, high, steeple, and cushioned pews of the church. After a few years of this process those who have actually been born of God become so outnumbered and intimidated by those worldly worshipers that the true saints give up their testimony and warfare against sin and worldliness. This results in the true worshiper losing his grip on God, and finally giving consent, usually without a clear understanding of just what he is doing, to be absorbed by the crowd who are worshiping the church.

Thank God, there are some of the saints who refuse to be swallowed up in the apostasy. They break ranks with the worldly church and form a new body of believers, while the backslidden, worldly body tries to draw itself to higher levels by its own effort, only to sink to lower and lower levels, until the church becomes totally corrupted. For there are no means within reach of human power or wisdom by which man can extricate himself from the awful clutches of sin by his own efforts. This is proved by the history of idolatry, for the worshipers have always degraded to the level of the idols of their own making, which idols, being of human origin, could have no

higher moral attributes than the one who conceived the idol.

In view of these facts if we do not wish the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene to follow the long line of apostatized churches, we must be very careful to do three things. First, as ministers we must see that those seeking membership in our church have brought forth fruits showing true repentance (Matt. 3:8); have abandoned all their sins, giving proof thereof by a heart-felt testimony and godly walk before the world_and the church. Second, the worldling must be kept from membership in the church at any cost, even if a probationary system is necessary. Third, as shepherds of the flock we must not only keep the wolves out of the flock, but if

Ministerial Ranks

"Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own concetts" (Rom. 12:16).

THAT THERE are higher and lower ranks in God's family is unmistakably taught in many places in the Scripture, and the verse quoted above plainly teaches it. It is our purpose to call attention to some of the different ranks in the church, or family, of God.

First, there are the rich and the poor. It has ever been so. If the reader will turn to Junes 2:1-9 he will see that God says it is sin to respect the rich and disregard the poor, or to give the poorest any less attention in the church than we do the richest. But what real spiritually minded person can fail to see that this very sin is being committed in many congregations? Saints of the Lord, beware of this subtle sin; for "he that committeth sin is of the devil." God warns the rich to rejoice in that he is made low, but the poor in that he is exalted.

I have never been able to see that the great Father, who loves all of His children alike. is pleased with the way His called ministers are salaried. To illustrate: I will suppose the case of two preachers who are called of God. Both have families of the same size, financial necessities the same, and both give all their time and strength into the work of the Lord; yet one receives for his labor from \$25 to \$45 a month (and often less), while the other receives from \$100 to \$200 a month. The one is forced, from necessity, to live in any small and inconvenient house, which is very uncomfortable and often unsanitary. The other is furnished a good parsonage, with beautiful carpets and a piano, and with spleudid furniture.

I wonder if the great, loving Father of us all had the opportunity of these matters, if the distribution would not be somewhat different, and more according to the real necessities. I think that the Levites, who were the Lord's ministers of that ago, received each one his equal part of the tithes, according to his real necessity. These things might be enlarged upon, but it is my purpose only to give a few hints.

Again, there are in God's family the educated and the unlearned. I am sure that education, when used in an humble way, has ever been God's throne of power and usefulness; yet the one of moderate education, and often even the illiterate, are used greatly to the pulling down of the strongholds of the Devil. The education which God only can give is absolutely essential to make one a soul winner.

I thank the Lord that He has ever had His Pauls and His Apolloses in His Church. I also thank Him that He still has and uses mightily those whose rank is with the humble fishermen of Galilee.

Has the War Changed the Bible?

I don't know much, but I do know that I have now traveled in the United States some 500,000 miles, have been all over every state in the union, and quite a good deal of Canada, and my honest convictions are that nothing on earth is so badly needed as a great revival of preaching the Word of God. God says, "My word shall not return unto me void." "The word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword." The psalmist says that "the entrance of thy words giveth light." Christ said, "My words are life." Christ is the Light of the world.

And now, since the present war has not changed the Word of God, nor the nature of man, and we know that God is the same unchangeable God that He was before the worldwar broke out, why should we have a great change in preaching the gospel when the soldiers come home? For the leaders of the "new move," as they call it, to want to pull down the house of God on a level with the world, will, after all, be nothing new under the sun; for the great bulk of the wealthy church members have, to my knowledge for the last twenty-five years been dancing and playing cards and running to shows of all kinds, and are yoked up with every kind of a worldly fraternity the world can contrive.

To do such a thing after the war, then, will by no means be something new, for we have had those things all the time for the last quarter of a century. Now, for the people to imagine we can not reach the young men after the war, unless we put into the churches card tables and smoking rooms, dancing parlors, and

Three Funerals and Their Lessons

NE SUNDAY afternoon we were called upon to conduct the funeral of a soldier boy. About two weeks before he left our town at his country's call, and went to the cantonment to which he was assigned. He soon received his uniform, sending his civilian clothes back to his parents. But instead of going to the field for drill he went to the hospital, and soon died as a result of an attack of influenza. He had yielded himself fully to his country and made the supreme gift of his life. He was willing to render faithful service, but he had no opportunity to do so, for death came too soon.

Do you remember the story of the boy who was converted on his dying bed, and just before passing out to the heavenly city said, "Must I meet my Savior empty-handed"? Christianity is meant for more than just to get one into heaven. It is for a life of faithful service and eternal rewards. No person has any time to lose in this life. Every day one puts off accepting Christ, and beginning the Christian life, shortens his time of service and robs him of rewards. Be wise and be a Christian now, and serve awhile before you go hence. Better get in with no service than not to get in at all; but much better to serve.

" On the next Saturday we were called upon to conduct the funeral of a man in middle life, who had, no doubt, been called to the ministry, but who had lost himself in business. Through preaching, the pleading of friends, and divine providences he had been faithfully warned. He would be deeply impressed for the moment, but soon again be lost in business. As death approached we talked to him faithfully, in company with his wife and mother-in-law. He told us he had been praying that day, that he believed God had forgiven and taken him back, and that living or dying he was going to be true to God. In less than twenty-four hours he slipped away, we trust to be with Jesus, but with his life mission all missed.

Friends, are you fulfilling your calling? Are you now working at your life mission? Or are you allowing some business of this world to so occupy your time and attention as to keep you from your real mission in the world? Business is blinding, deceiving, and damning many souls. Be very careful how it gets hold on you. But after this man came back to God and promised obedience, why was he not permitted to live and fulfill his mission? Is it not possible that God saw that restored to health the temptation back to business would be too great for him, and to save him He must take him on home? May this lesson take fast hold on us.

The next Tuesday we were called upon to assist in the funeral of a young married woman, who was the mother of one child. Several hours before her death she realized its approach, was conscious to the very last, and left a beautiful testimony. She called her mother to her side and said, "Mamma, did you know I was preparing to leave you? I have not been living as I should. I have confessed to God and I want to confess to you. You never allowed us to play cards, but I have been playing." She had continued in her church life but had fallen in with a society which held its social card parties, the wellthought-of folks of the town. Facing eternity she called this a pest which she had to get ridof, and she did and died very happy.

In nearly every town is this respectable

card set. Quite usually they are church folks. And in our own town are those who have, in the past, professed holiness. They argue for the innocency of these parties and cover up their gambling by calling it just a prize offered to the winner, and accuse us of narrowness because we disapprove and preach against such things. But let all such take warning from this voice just approaching the eternal city. Beware of self-deception, of the influence of worldly society, and of arguing against your own conscience. Whatever others may do, whatever may be popular in society or even in church circles, even though your preacher may attend the "movies," or your Sunday school superintendent may belong to the lodge and use tobacco, or your teacher wear jewelry and a scarcity of clothing, or your church have its social circles which indulge in questionable things, you must walk in the light the Holy Spirit gives to you. It means much to so live that on your dying bed there will be nothing to confess. Only the very few live that way. But what would sudden death mean to one who does not?

The voice from these three funerals is the voice of Jesus Christ saying, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteous-, And this "first" is not simply now, ness." but all of the time. Get in the kingdom now, and keep the kingdom first in your life all the time. Let first things be kept first. In all our living and doing let us keep the "eastern gate" in view.

Let Us Now Proceed to Degrade and Kill Our Soldier Boys

N EDITORIAL note in the Los Angeles Times is very suggestive, to say the least. Here it is:

SMOKE UP

The Y. M. C. A. has sold over a billion pack-ages of cigarettes to the boys in France. This is not the old-fashioned idea of the Y. M. C. A. service, and would annoy Lucy Gaston Page, but it goes now.

The Literary Digest, of October 26th, published a letter, "From the Front to the Folks at Home," written by Lieutenant Joseph Rodman, of the 18th Engineers, to his friends in Los Angeles. Here is a part of his letter, which is wholly about cigarettes:

which is wholly about cigarcttes: Besides myself, your box was enjoyed by a bunch of tobaccoless, moneyless, poor fellows just down from the front. One eighteen-year-old American boy, with both hands shot off at the wrists (the most irrepressibly cheerful man in the world), used to stick his grinning face over my bed so that I could put a lighted "tailor-made" in his cigarette holder. When his ash reached a precarious length ho would cause it to fall by champing his teeth on the holder and grinning meanwhile, as if he had discovered Ike Newton's pet Idea. One of your cigarettes was smoked by a dying man. His passing was vastly different from the soldier's death of fiction. There was no calling for wife, mother, or sweetheart. He praised your cigarette; cursed feebly be-cause his fresh milk tasted sour to him; and quietly "went west." There is a very small percentage of soldiers who do not smoke cigarettes. . . If you must send tracts and Testaments, why, indulge your whim; but if you want to soothe pain, camouflage the works of Statn, promote broth-erly love and the broader observance of the Golden Rule, send cigarettes first, and last, and all the time. To some of us this is horrible, and we arg

To some of us this is horrible, and we are sorry that it has over been written, and we say this with every ounce of fiber and every ounce of American blood back of the heroic boys who have bled and died on the battle front.

There are two questions that we raise: Is a young man a cleaner, stronger, better young man for being a cigarette fiend? Is a soldier a more courageous, daring, physically stronger soldier for having smoked several boxes of cigarettes?

Dr. J. H. Kellogg, of the famous Battle Creek Sanitarium, says, "Nicotine weakens the heart, lessens endurance, diminishes breathing capacity, benumbs the sensibilities, impairs the eyesight, stupefies the brain, and depreciates every mental, physical, and vital power of the man.>In the writer's opinion it is, at the present moment, the American soldier's most deadly foe." A similar opinion of many distinguished American physicians could be added.

That this deadly cigarette habit is fastening itself upon millions of men and women is vouched for by indisputable statistics. The total consumption of cigarettes for 1918 will aggregate forty billion. This is, approximately, thirty-eight billion more than in 1902, an alarming increase within sixteen years.

Thousands of our soldier boys who never smoked a cigarette have learned to use these dangerous coffin nails, and will come home from the war cigarette fiends, subject to all the weaknesses caused by this deadly habit.

. A subtle and vast advertising campaign has been carried on by the cigarette makers. The Sunday School Times, one of the best known and most reliable papers in the country, recently said:

An advertising campaign involving the out-lay of millions of dollars was entered into: space was bought in every publication that was for sale; the alluring advertisements come into every home; sympathy with the boy in the training camp and trench, in his lonell-ness and monotony, was aroused by appeals for something to relieve that situation; the cigarette was hit upon as the only relief, and thousands of good men and good women were prevailed upon to give their support to a cig-arette propaganda that, under any other cir-cumstances, would have found them bitterly opposed. In some places, even the school chil-dren were appealed to, to contribute to the "tobacco fund," and in not a few places the church lifted no warning voice.

What shall we do about this new danger to character and manhood? King Alcohol is about to die, but Queen Nicotine is taking the throne. The Young Men's Christian Association, which has done so much for the comfort of the soldier, is the main distributer; the churches have not even lifted a voice against this awful curse, but few right thinking citizens see the peril, because most of them indulge. In the name of God, shall we look with complacency upon this grave danger to our laddies, which, in the end, will rob them of physical strength, manhood, and moral fiber? It is a habit that leads to destruction. PASADENA, CAL

Perfection

"Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect" (Matt. 5: 48).

HAT THERE is some kind of perfection the Bible abounds with evidence (see Genesis 6:9). Here God testifics that Noah was a perfect man (Gen. 17:1). God commands Abram to be perfect (Job 1:1). God testifies that Job was a perfect man (Phil. 3:15). Paul testifies to perfec-tion for himself. Of course in the twelfth verse of this same chapter he (Paul) denies

perfection for himself, but here he has reference to resurrection perfection. What we are contending for is Christian perfection (again see Heb. 6:1). Here Paul commands the Hebrew brethren to go on unto perfection; and in our text the Savior commands the disciples to live this perfection. We see in these texts some were commanded to possess this perfection; it was testified of others that they had it; and others were commanded to live it. Then there must be some kind of perfection, but as to the kind of perfection it is yet to be settled.

We will first notice the negative of this subject. It is not angelic perfection. That is a state where we do not make mistakes, or miss the mark, unintentionally. But, thanks be to God, mistakes are not sins; that is, condemning sins. While every deviation from the perfect standard must be atoned for, as there were offerings made under the law for sins of ignorance, the blood of Jesus stands for all sins of ignorance now, unless the ignorance be willful. Men will be held accountable for light they might have had, as much as for what they have had. We must walk in all the light we have and seek more, or we will be condemned.

This perfection is not Adamic perfection. That is a state wherein we are free from disease. We will have pain and disease as long as we live, and the presence of disease does not prove that we are sinful.

Neither is this perfection resurrection perfection, which Paul said he had not attained to. We must yet die, or at least be changed from mortal to immortal.

Nor does this perfection mean godly perfection. That is, we are not omnipotent, omnipresent, omniscient, nor immutable.

What is this perfection? It is a state wherein we love God with all the heart, soul, mind, and strength, and our neighbor as ourselves. We conform our lives to the law of God, as best we understand it. We may miss the mark a thousand times, but if it is not intentional the blood of Jesus covers it all. Our heavenly Father looks over the mistakes and blunders that are not intentional. Yea, and He sympathizes with the weakest of His children, more than with the stronger ones. Like the man who, it was said, had three little girls, and one of them was feeble-minded. Having been away from home, he returned one day, and the children, wanting to show their appreciation of their father's return, brought him presents. The two bright children presented their father with a nice bouquet of flowers, while the other little child presented him with only a little bunch of rude sticks.

The father pushed the flowers aside, and accepted the little bunch of sticks. Why? Because of his great sympathy and love for the little child. So it is our heavenly Father looks on His weaker ones. It is not so much the offering that is made, but it is the motive back of it. We need not go down, though we make blunders.

The Cause of Backsliding

Beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own stedfastness (2 Peter 3: 17).

T HE APOSTLE PETER, with a prophetic eye, seesdanger ahead, and throws out the danger signal by way of calling our attention to the error of the wicked. Backslidings generally are the results of unguarded relations with unsaved persons; and Peter surely saw the oncoming tide of pleasure seeking and Sabbath breaking. So he says, "Beware lest ye also fall." He means not to be a partaker with the wicked in their sinful practices.

If some of your best friends prefer to join in with the Sunday excursion party, or spend an evening at a card party, see that you are not led into their errors for the sake of being friendly and social, and lose your steadfastness thereby.

The Apostle Paul says in 2 Thessalonians 2:3, in speaking of falling away in the latter days, "That day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition." It doesn't take a trained observer to note the definite falling away of the churches from their former doctrines and teaching. The old-time gospel of faith, repentance, regeneration, and sanctification m many places is thrown in the scrap basket, and new doctrines are taking its place.

These doctrines are termed by the apostle "doctrines of devils." How very inconsistent for a holy minister to dish out doctrines of dovils to his anxious, judgment-bound congregation. The most complete wreck and ruiu of the essentials of the Bible are discovered - in-books-being introduced in the churches; and some of them are adopted as standard doctrinal books for young ministers to study. The very worthy and honorable George Ridout, who is a successful holiness evangelist of the Methodist church, in a series of articles in the Christian Witness, stated that Rev. P. Sloan, of Redbank, N. Y., has made an exhaustive study of the new course of study, of the Methodist church. In an address at Ocean Grove he claims that there are some infidel books in the course, particularly Professor Soars' book, which is irreverent and destructive. He says there are ten books lined up with the new theology. One of them, "Clarke's Theology," by Professor W. N. Clarke, says there is not going to be any judgment day, no second coming of Christ, and no resurrection.

Professor Coe says, "The doctrine of natural depravity is an embarrassment." What are the Methodist preachers going to do about it? Mr. Ridout says it is bad enough to lose Joseph and his brethren, Daniel, David, and Jonah, but to have no miracles, no resurrection of Christ, no Bethlehem, no Nazareth. is worse yet. They also say there is no hell, Jesus is a fable, Abraham only an eponymous hero, Joseph is not, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego are mere dreams. Then, too, the books of Kings and Chronicles are removed, Ecclesiastes and the Song of Solomon ought never to have been in the Bible, according to the critics.

Mr. Ridout appears to have spent weeks in examining these spurious books. I have only mentioned a few items of what Mr. Ridout's research has revealed. What can be expected of the coming church, with a ministry trained in a church prescribing such a course of study as these books contain?

"And they shall turn away their ears from the truth" (2 Tim. 4:4). \sim

LET US first notice, in the second verse of this same chapter, what Paul calls attention to especially. The exhortation is to a brother preacher. "Preach the word"— God's Word, the Bible. Paul seems to think this brother should know that he should preach the truth, in senson and out of senson; for there are times it may seem out of senson to some folks to preach the truth, but Paul says, "Preach the word."

Lately a man was heard to say, "I do n't like to go to a meeting where I feel worse by going than by not going. And when I go to church I want to go home and not feel that I have been disturbed or upset, and lament for hearing something contrary to man." So here the ear is turned from the truth, and will not go to hear it again; perhaps because it caused unrest to the sinful soul and the guilty conscience.

The car is the inlet to the inner man, that we may close it against that which we don't want to hear; or we may leave it open, whichever we may choose to do. The ear imparts to the soul that which will either disturb, or make more case and comfort. This fact is well recognized: that if the preacher can get a hearing, he has the greatest chance afforded to get to the hearts of the people. We simply must get the ear first, before we can get at the heart. The ear and the heart seem to be very closely connected, for we can awaken the heart by getting the ear's attention.

It is not all the laymen or the worldly classes who are turning away from the "truth." The preachers are largely to blame for the condition of the churches of today; and also the condition of the world, which has no profession. I find that there are plenty of people who want to know the truth, and will stand back of the fellow who preaches it, as well. The preacher is heard to say, "My people will not stand for holiness preaching, and I will lose my job; and perhaps my bread and butter." There may be a great deal of truth in that statement; however, I believe there are enough in those same churches who will stand for it, and will support the fellow who will dare to preach the "truth."

Recently I went into a city where they told me that I would be run out of town for preaching that kind of religion, that I would not get a hearing, and the people would not stand for it at all; but after I was there five weeks they were calling for a Pentecostal Nazarene preacher to preach to them all the year round. Now we have a church there, and a preacher as well.

Well. hallelujah! There are some people left in the old world who want the truth which Paul was talking about here. Preachers, let's preach it. Laymen, stay at the job, and stand back of that preacher who will dare to stand these days, fearlessly, and preach it.

Real "truth" preachers are not so plentiful as we might think. We are having calls, from all over the country for real truth preachers to come and preach to the people. Even if there are some who will not hear us, what will that matter to us at the judgment day? Let us not be slackers in this great calling, but let the world and the Devil know that we are still preaching and telling the truth wherever we go. And while we are telling it we will have the smile of heaven on our souls, and will feel easy and free, and be as happy as one can be here in this old world.

We are glad to announce to our people that we have gone "over the top" for fifty thousand dollars in the Eastern Nazarene College campaign, which is a beginning to make a college of the first rank in this great eastern country. On my arrival home from the General Foreign Missionary Doard meeting I had a telegram from the General Superintendents, stating that the influenza had caused a postponement of the southern Assemblies, so that it would be impossible to hold our campaign before Christmas. We concluded to start a small war emergency campaign to tide us over until we could hold the big campaign. Feeling that we could not be able to get the three General Superintendents, we wired General Superintendent Goodwin to know if he had arrived in Providence, R. I., and to know if he could help us in a small campaign for two weeks.

Ere he had arrived in Providence, R. I., we had decided to try a few of our best churches on a big campaign in order that we might know what the Lord would have us do regarding the campaign. We wired Lowell and Haverhill Thursday night, telling them we would be there on Sunday. So the General Superintendent and myself went to Lowell with very little announcement for the Sabbath morning service. Brother Goodwin poured out his heart to the people and gave them a vision of our responsibilities if they would do something worth while Tor the school... the land." They hilariously and enthusiastically subscribed \$7,590.

We went to Haverhill that evening and were FIVEN about \$25,000, making over \$10,000 subscribed on the first day of the campaign, which, added to the \$1,000 given by a friend to start the campaign and \$1,000 subscribed by the teachers and students of Eastern Nazarene College, made \$12,000. God continued to marvelously bless our people during the week, so that en Saturday night of the first week we had about \$8,000.

The second Sunday we visited Cambridge, Malden, and Lynn, who gave over \$10,000, making a grand total of \$28,000 for the first eight Cays. We continued the next week in New England District, having raised about \$35,000, when we went to the New York District. General Superintendent Reynolds kindly agreed to hold Brother Goodwin's first Assembly on the Little Rock District, thereby giving us one week for our campaign. Then the postponement of the Dallas District Assembly gave us still another week, which was all unexpected when we began the campaign.

General Superintendent Reynolds came to Washington, D. C., on general church business and we tried to arrange a slate in the campaign for him, but it seemed the people thought it was an inopportune time to enter into the campaign. We continued the campaign in the New York District about a week, the people riving us a most hearty response. On the last Sabbath day we held services at Utica Avenue, Richmond Hill, Atlantic Avenue, and John Wesley churches in Brooklyn. Finding that we could get part of another week of Brother Goodwin's time we arranged with Superintendent J. T. Maybury to visit several churches on the Washington and Philadelphia District. Though all the services were held on the week days in this District, yet they gave liberally of their means, so that by Thanksgiving day we had gone "over the top" for \$50,000.

The last week of the campaign Rev. W. A. Millett, of Eastern Nazarene College; Rev. Paul H. Hill, Superintendent E. E. Angell, of the New York District, and Rev. S. W. Beers, and the writer held meetings on the various Districts in the interest of the school, the people responding heartily. So the marvelous results were not due to our planning, for all our plans were completely smashed by conditions over which we had no control. We had planned to put on a big advertising campaign before the general campaign with the three General Superintendents, but being so busy in the campaign we could only wire in over the Sabbath the results. So with very little advertising and at an unexpected time the Holy Ghost led the people to give over \$50,000 for a college in this eastern-country.

The success of our campaign, humanly speaking, was due to the untiring efforts of our General Superintendent, Rev. J. W. Goodwin, who poured out his very soul in behalf of a great college in this eastern country, which is the home of his nativity. Although worn in body, the Holy Ghost seemed to come upon him in such unusual power that the heavens opened upon us. Thank God for our General Superintendents who have helped us with their plans and prayers and given us such encouragement for our holiness schools. They have brought to pass things that we would have deemed impossible a few years ago. Truly they are loyal, whole-hearted, self-sacrificing, heroic, untiring, and full of faith and deserve our support and commendation.

Space forbids us to tell of the wonderful sacrifices of our people and the loyalty and cooperation of our worthy pastors who are ready to live or die for the cause of holiness. Such heroic sacrifices are sure to be productive of great results in the near tomorrows. A number have already sent in part of their subscriptions. Accept our thanks for the same. NORTHWEST NAZARENE COLLEGE

Northwest Nazarene College was under quarantine for six weeks and finally found it necessary to close on account of the epidemic. We plan to open December 30th and dispensing with vacations hope to be able to make up the work by the close of the year without unduly extending the length of the term.

For four weeks we succeeded by close quarnutine to keep clear of the "flu," but at last it dropped down upon us and in about three days we turned the college into three hospitals with full quota of nurses, day and night shifts, kitchen crews, waiters, and attendants. We had from forty-eight to fifty-five cases at one time and seventy cases in all. In many colleges there would have been a panic, but our students stood by nobly and our nurses watched over the sick day and night. We are grateful to God for His mercy-to-us, and through His. help and the exceptionally good care given by our nurses there was not a single death occurred on the campus. Our fine class of nurses registered in the medical nursing course of the missionary de-partment secured much practical experience of an exceedingly practical kind, but they were equal to the situation. These are things that try the mettle of students and we are delighted with the strength and efficiency manifested by these planning score to enter some form of d those planning soon to enter some form of direct Christian work.

The missionary course has been marked by rapid development far above anything we orig-inally planned. God has been blessing the work remarkably, and is also laying upon our hearts in a peculiar way the necessity of giving large attention to the missionary phase of our college work. We now have a number of valuable col-lege courses especially adapted to the needs of students preparing for home or foreign service.

Dr. and Mrs. Mangum have the medical nursing course well in hand and will develop the work as rapidly as buildings and equipment can be secured. Through the kindness of the North Pacific District we soon hope to have a medical \mathbf{x} missionary building, and the Northwest Dis-trict will furnish the much needed girls' dormitory.

In addition to the medical nursing course there are a number of other courses being of-fered which form a part of any comprehensive missionary course. Professor Sutherland is a master of languages and is arranging a department embracing the study of phonetics and language study, including the vernacular of a number of our mission fields. Professor Winclester is offering several valuable courses in the history and practice of missions, and has charge of our missionary bands. Professor Swalm is offering excellent courses in education Swaim is offering excellent courses in education and will soon be able to provide for practical training for those looking forward to educa-tional missionary work. Professor Shields is arranging to offer special work in Christian doctrine which will enable students to grapple "with present-day cults and heresies. The ex-cellent work in science and English offered by Professor Marshell Miss Everyth and Miss For-Professor Marshall, Miss Forsyth, and Miss Fer-ris, and the well-equipped music department in charge of Mrs. McHose and Miss Goozee afford excellent opportunities for students desiring thorough preparation. We aim to provide the best for the students of this Northwest Educational District.

The students are writing to us that they plan to return as soon as class work begins, Decem-ber 30th, and it seems that the greater majority of the students will again take up the work which has been so greatly interrupted this year. A number of new students are planning to en-ter the second semester. Our first semester's registration reached over 280 students.

Best of all, the fire has been falling in the old-fashioned way. We still love the old, rugged way of the cross and believe God wants us to keep before the students the "rough rider as-pect" of the Nazarenes which Dr. Bresee so continually held before some of us. We let them plow through until by faith they come up with shining faces and ringing hallelujahs. Sev-eral students entered this year in order primarily to find the satisfying experience of entire sanctification. Needless to say, they soon "died out" and now know they have the bless-ing without doubt, and are among our best students. International Sunday School Lesson

January 12 MOSES THE LEADER OF ISRAEL Exodus 3:1-12

Golden Text-Moses verily was faithful in all his house (Heb. 3: 5).

THE LESSON OUTLINE

H. Orton Wiley, D.D.

The qualifications necessary for true leadership and the manner in which God prepared His servant Moses are admirably set forth in this lesson. Leadership depends not alone upon breadth of vi-sion but also upon intensity of purpose and perseverance in faith. This faith is not to be confused with mero human determination but is inspired by the pres-ence of the invisible God. "Moses en-dured as social black of the test that dured as seeing him who is invisible" (Heb. 11: 27).

I. The Solitude of the Desert.

1. Solitude is necessary to communion with God; communion with God is essential to leadership which is strong and true. Moses at the backside of the desert received his commission to lead three million people out of bondage; Elijah came from the desert to defeat the priests of Baal on Mt. Carmel; John was in the desert "until his shewing unto Israel;" and our Lord himself, in supreme conflict, met and defeated the Prince of this world in the wilderness amidst the wild beasts.

2. Our Lord teaches the necessity of solitude for true prayer. "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret" (Matt. 6; 6). The door of our Hearts must be shut to the voices of the world and to our own wandering thoughts. We must press beyond physical inertia, mental lethargy, and the powers of spiritual darkness before we learn to pray as we should.

II. The Vision and the Voice.

God manifested Himself to Moses in a vision and by a voice. This is still His method of manifesting Himself to men. By the vision of spiritual life seen in others He draws men aside to contemplation; in solitude He speaks to those whom He has drawn aside into the hush of His presence.

1. The Vision: A Flame of Fire in a Bush. Couched in this verse is a beau-A Flame of Fire in tiful prophecy of Jesus the Nazarene, and of the true nature of a Christian. The word "Nazarene" is from "nezer," which literally translated means a "bush," a "shrub," or a "branch." In Isalah 11:1 we rend, "A Branch [liter-ally, a Nazarene] shall spring forth from his roots." See also Zech. 3:9; 6:12. Jesus the Nazarene, as the world regards Him, is but a common bush; but to those who see Him truly He is a bush in whom dwells the fire of the divine Presence. True Nazarenes, like their Master, are but lowly in the eyes of the world, but,

On the first day of December we opened up in First Church, Spokane, with Rev. C. Warren Jones. The "flu" ban had been lifted on all public gatherings. During Thanksgiving time the people took off their straps and got together in celebration until the influenza broke out again. It almost caused us to have to close down again. The health officer would allow churches to have their services, but they had to have every other seat vacant and would not allow any singing only by the choir. You know how hard it was for Pentecostal Nazarenes to try to have a revival without congregational singing. They said nothing about praying and shouting. So we went in for two weeks and prayed the fire down. Several good cases got through. The last night twenty-two were at the altar, the pastor said the most of them were new cases.

The entertainment was of the very best with Brother and Sister Jones. They are indefat-igable workers. Twice they labored until two a. m. with souls. They have the vision of our church.
