PILGRIMS who travel the Way of Holiness are an exclusive company. Isaiah said, "The unclean shall not pass over it; . . . but the redeemed shall walk there." The "Do not enter" sign is not enforced by arbitrary judgment. No national, racial, social, intellectual, or ceremonial demands are made of those who pursue their heavenly goal by using this "superhighway." They must have the qualifications, but they are all within the reach of those who have appropriated the provisions of redeeming grace.

The Way of Holiness is clearly defined in the Christian's Guidebook, the Bible. It is also perfectly illuminated both by day and night. Therefore "the wayfaring men, though fools, shall not err therein." This does not mean that the fool will not blunder and stumble. It does mean that God in His infinite wisdom knows the measure of the responsibility of the simple-minded, and in His great mercy judges him accordingly. If he falters and almost fails, God will bear him up as on eagles' wings.

The travelers are all going the same direction on the Way of Holiness. It is "one-way traffic." There are no intersections, but one does need to watch for "merging traffic," for others of like faith are joining the redeemed. There are no "U turns." No one ever starts on the heavenward way and deliberately decides to face about and go to hell. Nevertheless. there are "detours" branching off to the right and left. They all lead into dangers. For while lions and ravenous beasts are not found on the way, they lurk in the shadows along it and are ever ready to devour those who fall prey to them. If those who turn aside escape the destruction of ferocious powers of evil, they will find themselves in confusion and delusion. All the "short cuts" and "bypasses" have "dead ends." They lead nowhere.

Like all the ways men travel, the Way of Holiness has two sides, and there are dangers on either of them. It also has a middle where the greatest margin of safety is found. Therefore the "middle-of-the-roaders" are not compromisers or straddlers. They believe in "safety first" and seek maximum progress with minimum peril.

Pilgrims of the holy way are happy. "The ransomed of the Lord shall . . . come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads: they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away."

YOU TEACH TRUTH

IN A DAY when many false doctrines are abroad, men need light to find their way. God's Word will be a "lamp" unto their feet. Bible truth is the best antidote for error. We will win men to Christ, not by argumentation, but by proclamation of the truth.

You teach truth which has a higher source than man. William Jennings Bryan put the challenge to those who rejected the divine inspiration of the Bible to put their theories to the test and produce a book the equal of the Bible, or admit that the Bible comes from a source higher than man, or that man has so degenerated that less can be expected of him now than nineteen hundred years ago. Teach with authority if you teach the divinely inspired Word.

You teach truth that all men need. The Creator of man is the Author of the Book you teach. It contains the truths that all men need, and the only truth that meets men's needs. The Bible is the universal Book with universal value and

appeal.

You teach truth that brings life and joy and happiness. Contrary to the worldling's ideas, but true as truth itself, God's desire is man's happiness. Bible truth makes clear that the righteous man is the blessed, truly happy man. He has life, stability, a hidden source of strength, fruitage, and perennial freshness. The Psalmist shows the real contrast between the righteous and the wicked; the righteous are like the living, flourishing, fruitful tree, as compared with the chaff, the victim of every wind—lifeless, rootless, fruitless.

You teach truth regarding the direction of man's help. The human prerequisites sound paradoxical. Death is the gateway to life; mourning is the prelude to happiness; loss is the source of gain; surrender is the strategy for victory; servitude is the path to greatness; humility puts one on the divine elevator; slavedom is the only door to freedom. "He that loseth his life . . . shall find it," Jesus said (Matt. 10:39). God would make it clear that salvation is not through human merits or efforts. "By grace are ye saved through faith" (Eph. 2:8). When a man fully realizes his helplessness, he has reached the place of help. When faith ceases to be a credential and becomes the helpless, upreaching hand of necessity, God reaches down. When you teach Bible truth, you point to the God of all grace as the only source of human help.

You teach truth about living at peace with God's world. This is a moral universe. Men who live in sin, disregarding and disobeying God's will and law, can live at peace neither with themselves nor with God. When you teach men about

God's will. Furthermore, when you teach the revealed law regarding human conduct, you teach the code that is in harmony with the moral universe. Philosophers fumble in the dark when it comes to the science of conduct. You teach truth that is crystal-clear—what a panacea for our confused generation! Man can live at peace with God's world if he will live by the truth of God's Word.

You teach the truth about the nature and character of God; about the origin, duty, and destiny of man; about human sin and the divine remedy; about the kingdom of God, which "is righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost" (Rom. 14:17); about life, death, and eternity. When you teach the Bible you not only teach the truth about fallen man's lost estate and present plight, but also point the way to an inheritance among them who are sanctified and made whole.

You teach truth that is eternal. The intellectual fads and philosophies change and shift as the sands. When you teach Bible truth you stand on the impregnable Rock of Ages. Though the devices of man may purport to melt the earth with fervent heat, we rest assured that His Word is indestructible. Jesus said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away" (Matt. 24:35).

The Bible and the Boy Next Door

I saw him as he climbed out of the cockpit of the late model jet fighter plane. Beneath the trappings of his flying suit was the body of a young man—crew haircut, gay smile, and adventurous spirit. A few minutes before he had flown his plane at a speed faster than sound. Just who was he? He was, and is, a part of this generation which we call youth.

I looked into the science laboratory of a large university science building and saw what looked to be a small army of people peering into test tubes, boiling weird-looking concoctions in glass vessels over the flame of Bunsen burners. Members of that "army" were tinkering with such things as atomic power, the latest research which may sound the death knell to man's common enemy—disease. Again, who were they? The same answer—youth.

We see them tearing about town in "hopped up" cars, their apparent unconcern for life or property, whether theirs or someone else's, a problem to the community. They seem to be a totally different generation from anything the world ever has produced before. In such settings as these one might almost wonder, Could it be that a book of such ancient origin as the Bible can find a place of interest or value in the lives of such youth as these?

Sometime last year, *Time* magazine boldly stated that "the younger generation is looking for a faith . . ." Even children of the atomic age must have a pivot point to their lives; and when we contemplate the uncertainty and confusion attendant to the materialistic thinking of our times, it becomes more readily apparent that even in this age of "crazy, mixed-up kids" (as youth has been characterized by one modern writer), the Bible is still able to speak with the voice of authority, commanding a place in the living of even the "boy next door" who so vitally characterizes the spirit of modern youth.

Though it is true that modern young people

have exchanged the horse-drawn chariot or donkey for "hot rods" or "jets," it is equally true that the voice of the boy next door can be heard saying, as did his counterpart two thousand years ago: "Father, give me my share of the family inheritance now, that I may

invest it in present opportunity and retire on pension before I'm out of the N.Y.P.S. age." It is likewise true that the same principles of failure and return are for modern prodigals just as meaningful and characteristic as in Christ's day. Externals have changed, but beneath the modern accouterments of civilization in the "age of the atom" lie the same basic problems, desires, and needs. Sin has altered its form, but its effect remains the same; and the same remedy for sin which lifted the curse from the hearts of Roman young people living in the ancient catacombs can be applied with equal success to the life of the boy or the girl who lives next door to your home.

A good many young people of my acquaintance seem to be looking for something which will dare them to be different. We see the effect of this among that group of teen-agers who would dress in "outlandish" (to us who are more mature) garb, or ride the highways at reckless speed. We click our tongues and remark that all they want of life is a new thrill. Perhaps that is true, but it seems to me that the same basic urge which sends a young man or woman down a long church aisle to an altar of prayer is a part of the spirit of daring which in other realms we would deplore. Let modern youth hear the words of Christ uttered two thousand years ago: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Matt. 16:24), and you will find even in this generation those who will respond to the challenge of giving everything for a cause.

Last week "the boy next door" was in my office. He had not been attracted to our church through a stellar youth program, nor had he been inspired by great preaching. Though he came from a godless home, he had found peace of mind and heart from searching the Scriptures. His testimony still rings in my thinking, for though it cost him the privilege of living at home, he had

found that the treasure within the pages of the old, outdated, black-bound Book was more to him than the comforts of home, and for this treasure he would remain true to his God. I like to think that this is exemplary of the spirit of modern youth—the same spirit which will



The Bible in the Home

Most of our homes have one or more copies of the Holy Scriptures. The silent witness of these Bibles on shelf or table could be greatly multiplied by regular and devotional reading of the Word in its entirety. Through family and private devotions the home is a good

place to promote and to acquire the practice of day-to-day reading from the Scriptures. Of course some passages of scripture have more meaning and interest than others, but piecemeal reading often omits many rich treasures from the Word.

Several years ago I made a statement in a sermon that everyone ought to read the Bible through at least once in a lifetime. At the close of the service a lady seventy-three years of age came to me about it. She told me she had been a Christian and had read her Bible regularly for over fifty years but had not once read it entirely through. She said: "I am going to meet the Lord in just a few short years and, God being my Helper, I will read the entire Bible before I die. I do not want to stand before Him and confess that I never did read His entire Word."

Our homes can make the Bible more meaningful by encouraging and promoting memorization and study of the Scriptures. For instance, a few years ago I visited in the home of a nearly blind Christian lady who was a true saint of God. One of her great sorrows was that she could no longer read her Bible, but she would testify and quote long passages of scripture though she was almost ninety years of age. One day she said: "Each day the Holy Spirit takes me through the Bible again. He helps me to remember the verses I memorized when I was young." She had followed the example of the Psalmist, who said, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee" (Ps. 119:11).

We need a renewal and a revival of Bible reading and Bible study in our homes. We need to know the truth and the spirit of the Scriptures. The Bible is God's message to us and to the world. We need to know and understand that message.

Read the Word with your heart open for God's blessing and He will send you spiritual refreshment. Study the Word under divine illumination and your faith will be strengthened. Believe the Word and your soul will find assurance in the promise of the unfailing God. Obey the Word, and the Spirit of God will guide you in the paths of righteousness. Exalt the Word and sinful, lost mankind will find the way to eternal life. Teach

GROWTH

As we walk in the light the Lord will show us spiritual truths constantly that we never have seen before. These truths will be revealed to us as we walk in the light. That is, there must be obedient response to God's will all along the way if we expect to continue in His grace and to allow the Lord to cleanse us from all sin.

Some of the truths God will show us are concerning personal spiritual living. The faithful Holy Spirit will reveal some actions, words, attitudes that need correction. He will also indicate areas of spiritual omission where we have failed God.

When a person is given new light like this, there are three possible reactions. Two of these are headed for spiritual defeat. First, if new light is given to the sanctified heart, the person may feel defeated. Such an individual might say to himself, "If this is wrong, then I am not sancti-Thus throwing away his confidence, he is spiritually defeated and his faith in God weakened. A second possibility is that of too easily excusing oneself. Such a person might say, "I am sanctified, and therefore this is not wrong." To do this is to cut oneself off from the cleansing power of Christ and the direction of the Holy Spirit. From this sort of response to new light arise the glaring discrepancies between profession and practice. Having claimed the cleansing power of God, some blunder ahead as though God could do nothing further for them. Being unteachable, both God and man can look only in pity on them.

The third possible response to new light is freely to open the heart to God's revealing grace. The "eternal yes" that was said to the Lord when the consecration was made complete still applies. Thus with perfect love in the heart toward God, one accepts the new light and puts it into practice. So God leads on from strength to strength and from glory to glory.

You have heard of the "unknown bundle." It was the vast unknown future wrapped up in that load which was laid on the altar before God. One never knows what truths God will reveal down the road, but the "yes" is already said. Some of us need more teaching than others. Some of us started on a lower level when the consecration was made. "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (I John 1:7).

ROCK FOUNDATION

Behold, I lay in Zion for a foundation a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone, a sure foundation (Isa. 28:16).

Into this world of wickedness came the Son of God, promised to us from the beginning of time. He was to be a sure Foundation for those who believed in Him; but most of the world was trusting in a refuge of lies of their own making.

Both the Psalmist and the Apostle Peter affirmed in no uncertain language that Jesus Christ was the Stone which the builders rejected. Isaiah tells us here that, although God had laid a rock foundation in Zion, many people had already built themselves a refuge of lies. There must have been only a very few who had built on the rock foundation that moral structure for their lives on those horizontal and vertical lines that God had stretched out for their building guidance.

Here is a short list of the lies that we sometimes hear. Invite somone to attend church, and his answer might be, "I support my own church." If God were to give an immediate, audible reply, it might well be, "Yes, you do support it—about five dollars a year, if the canvasser urges you long enough."

Again we hear, "I attend another church." But if we had a chance to look at God's record we might see this—"Attends church faithfully, both on Easter Sunday and at Christmas time, if nothing hinders." I believe God would always have an answer for the other half of these half-truths.

Here is a half-truth we hear quite often, "I'm just as good as a lot of church people are"—and we feel like reminding that person, "Yes, my friend, and you're just as bad as most of them are."

Another says, "I'm too busy to go to church." God might well ask him, "Busy at what? club meetings? church bingo? Saturday night revelry? Sunday sports? Sunday visiting?"

All of these lies and half-truths point directly at a great personal neglect, "The stone which was set at nought" by the builders. How foolish it is for people to build that refuge of lies under which they will try to hide until the Judgment! The hail and the flood will wash both lies and the sinners into the great pit of destruction. What a pity when they could just as well have builded their moral structure on the rock foundation!

In verse seventeen, this building line by which we will be judged is placed by God alongside the rock foundation, so that we can build our lives on that foundation. Thus we can get them straight in line with God's moral standards. If we can pile up layer upon layer of stone or brick and get it straight up and down with His plumb line, then our relations will be right between us and God—laid to His plummet in true holiness.

If we build along God's horizontal lines, we get our relationships right with our fellow men; and when we get built up alongside His vertical plumb line, then we stand right with God. We shall then be fulfilling the law as summed up by Christ, ". . . love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and . . . thy neighbour as thyself."

But all around us we hear people say that their idea of moral standards is just as good as Moses' laws were. They were hiding behind a lie that is as shifting as a flood. I stood on a great rock jutting out into a stormy Pacific, and got nearly dizzy as I watched the waves pounding against it. But when I shifted my gaze to the rock underneath, the dizziness left me, and I was thankful to be on a rock foundation. I am thankful today that God made laws that are still as unmovable as that rock, and not altered nor changed to suit every individual whim and fancy.

In the midst of our many revivals, there are still too many people who are rejecting the Christ. Multitudes are hiding behind their bulwark of lies. Peter preached one morning to the rulers, the elders, and the scribes, "This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders" (Acts 4:11). But only the day before, after the lame man was healed by the Temple gate, five thousand of the common people had been converted. They had planted their feet on a solid foundation. I am glad today to be one of that mighty throng who are standing on the rock Foundation—Jesus Christ!

Scriptures in 1,077 Languages

Some part of the Bible has been published in 1,077 languages and dialects, as of December 31, 1953, according to a statement issued by the American Bible Society.

The whole Bible was published for the first time in Luo and Nupe, languages of Africa, and in Karo Batak, spoken in Sumatra.

Complete New Testaments were published for the first time in Roviana, spoken in the Solomon Islands; Meru, spoken in Kenya, East Africa; and Simalungun Batak, spoken in Sumatra.

The American Bible Society added five new languages to the list in which it has published the Scriptures, three of which are spoken in Africa: Bano'o in the Cameroons; Gbeapo and Tchien, both spoken in Liberia; and two Mexican dialects, Mazahua and Tlapaneco.

There are some ninety languages in which short passages or collections of passages have been published, but in which no complete book of the Bible has appeared.

Mental Exercise

How often do we hear people speak of what they term "brain fag"? Of course, there is no such thing. It is simply a case of abuse of the mental faculties and misdirected thinking to the extent that every thought seems to end in a period of exhaustion. The greatest thinkers the world has ever known never knew what it was to suffer "brain fag" or rest because of mental exhaustion. The human brain, like the heart, goes right along at all times in its action, but of course when a person is asleep there is a sort of suspended action.

Proper mental exercise is very necessary to the well-being of the heart, mind, and soul. Mental prostration comes as a result of physical exertion or misdirected thinking. The person of whom

others say, "He never has a care," is one whose mind is mostly unemployed and who is indifferent to the real issues of life which require careful thinking. Proper physical exercise generates good mental exercise. Cicero said that it is exercise alone that supports the spirits and keeps the mind in vigor. Our minds are certainly invigorated and enlarged with regular periods of meditation and thinking on the things God has done for us and is going to do.

It was Virgil who said that mind moves matter. Shakespeare said that it is the mind that makes the body rich! These verities should be indelibly stamped upon our calendar for daily living in such a way as to cause us to activate them with daily regularity. It is the quiet period that counts most for mental exercise. It is then that the mind is not in a frenzy with some matter at hand. Someone has said that almost all of the great minds were formed in secrecy and in solitude. It is certain that no great minds ever came into being in a turmoil of bedlam and frenzied going about over nothing really worth-while. Really great minds come out of those hallowed moments of relaxation and meditation when God is closer and values are more vividly written across one's mental screen.

Catullus penned, "Oh, what is more sweet than when the mind, set free from care, lays its burden down!" It is surprising when one first realizes the physical benefits that come after proper mental exercises have been performed. It could not be any other way. After all, our physical apparatus is completely under the rule of our mental make-up. Proper physical exercise relaxes the mind, even if it is only a short walk in a quiet park; and proper mental exercise relaxes the body.

Many people say they do not have time for meditation. That time never comes unless it is realized and seized upon. Disraeli said that the art of meditation may be exercised at all hours, and in all places; and men of genius, in their walks, at table, and amidst assemblies, turning the eye of the mind inwards, can form an artificial solitude; retired amidst a crowd, calm amidst distraction, and wise amidst folly. The art of meditation is the key to mental exercise that keeps the mind from centering on any single thing which can cause it to become exhausted and unproductive of direction.

Meditation is the precious exercise of the mind which brings to one's attention the great truths, the beauties, and purposeful activities which make life joyful and worth-while. Did you ever hear of anyone sitting in a lovely garden or drinking in the beauties of a verdant forest glen or hill-top who complained of "brain fag"? Of course not! Proper exercise of the mental make-up was under way. For inspiration, mental and physical rejuvenation, and a closer walk with God, our minds must be centered on things spiritual and allowed to bask in the healing sunshine of meditation. That is the only mental exercise that brings desired results.

THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL LESSON

Topic for December 12: Growth in Grace Scripture: II Pet. 1:2-11 (Printed: same)

Golden Text: Grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ (II Pet. 3:18).

The subtle tendency toward spiritual stagnation is so strong that few of us completely resis: it. The danger of looking back to the past, although at times essential, is that our gaze might linger too long and we lose our spirit of adventure. We enjoy settling down and "resting a while." There are some who have become so enamored with the "good old days" that they have become blind and immune to the present, and highly intolerant of anything new. The older we grow, the more we need to watch and pray that we become not too timid to tackle the untried things ahead. The writer of Ecclesiastes in the closing chapter describes one of the characteristics of age as being "afraid of that which is

high." We lose our agility, the muscles lose their flexibility, the bones become brittle, and we become more and more conscious of the danger of falling; hence we venture less from the tried path. We become overcautious and, in defense, at times critical of those who strike out ahead. God has had to arouse His servants from this lethargy time and time again, as He did in the instance of His servant Joshua: "Now Joshua was old and stricken in years; and the Lord said unto him, Thou art old and stricken in years, and there remaineth vet very much land to be possessed" (Josh. 13:1).

A man never passes his prime spiritually until he ceases to grow in grace and willingly accepts the belief that the best is behind him. There is always much land ahead to be pos-

sessed if only we can be aroused. In fellowship with Christ the best days always lie ahead; even death becomes a doorway into the eternal city of vast and glorious adventure. The lessons of yesterday should stand us well in our todays and in conquest of tomorrow. The valleys we have gone through and the mountains we have scaled will provide us with understanding hearts and forbearance for those who have yet to make the perilous journey. As we add to our Christian living the disciplines of grace as outlined by Peter-faith, virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness, and charity -our progressing years shall continue to give birth to new victories and glorious conquests. Above all, we will increase in our knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ.



Anniversary Year

A LITTLE more than a century and a half ago, a girl's craving for her own Bible opened a new field of Christian endeavor which has had no parallel in history.

Then—as now—millions were without the Word of God. But little Mary Jones, daughter of a Welsh weaver, did not think of the problems of millions. She knew only that she wanted a Bible as her own and that it was her own personal problem.

The story of Mary and how she got her Bible is one of the most heartwarming tales of faith. First she had to learn to read, then spend six years saving. When at last she had accumulated enough for her purchase, Mary trudged barefoot for twenty-five miles, to learn that Bibles no longer were being published in her native Welsh and that none was obtainable.

It was Rev. Thomas Charles, of the village of Bala, in Wales, who gave the girl her Book in the year 1800. To the minister it had been evident for

years that the supply of Bibles for the Welsh people had been pitifully inadequate, and every effort to get more had fallen upon agencies already overburdened with other duties or had resulted in prices too high for the scanty means of the people.

In the same year, 1800, an edition of 10,000 Bibles was exhausted in four months and whole districts failed to receive any. Two years later, Mr. Charles tentatively suggested to some friends on a committee of a Religious Tract Society his idea for a new society. The society would supply Scriptures for the people of Wales.

The idea caught fire. The alert mind of Joseph Hughes saw its possibilities. "If for Wales, why not for the kingdom? Why not for the world?" Why not, indeed?

On March 7, 1804, the British and Foreign Bible Society was launched. One hundred and fifty years later, people of at least sixty nations are commemorating the historic event.

There are now twenty-four national Bible societies, all joined in the United Bible Societies, and they are currently distributing 20,000,000 volumes of Scripture each year.

Although the jubilee year, 1954, is being observed with proper appreciation and thanksgiving for the accomplishments of the past, it is also a period for serious reflection on the work still to be done. Hundreds of millions of people are still without their copies of the Scriptures and the number grows greater, rather than less, each year.

The first aim of the societies was to increase distribution during 1954 to 25,000,000 copies, a total designed to keep pace with the birth rate. By 1960, it is hoped that 50,000,000 copies will be distributed annually.

The second goal is to bring about a mass statement of faith in the Scriptures—the greatest mass statement in human history. All who believe in

THE QUESTION BOX

Q. Would you say that most of our Nazarene church members are living up to the doctrine of entire sanctification?

A. A person does not have to be sanctified wholly in order to be a member of the Church of the Nazarene. He must believe in sanctification as a second work of grace, but he does not have to possess it in order to join our church. Since this is the case, I prefer to state your question thus: Would you say that most of the members of the Church of the Nazarene who profess to have the blessing of entire sanctification are living up to this doctrine? It would be easy to answer your question in the negative, as some ministers and laymen among us do. Nevertheless, when I stop and give it serious thought, I am not inclined to say, "No." Who am I to sit on the judgment seat and claim to know the condition of the hearts of men? A more pertinent question, I think, is this: Am I, as one who professes to be saved and sanctified, living up to my profession? Are you, as a member of the Church of the Nazarene and a professor of holiness, living what you profess? In answering you the way I have, that is, by making your question personal, I have no desire to put you on the spot or imply that you did not have a right to ask the general question which you did. I am sure you were sincere in what you asked. Still, I believe that it is best for you and me to judge ourselves and not others. The allimportant thing is for each of us to get the second blessing and live it. By the grace of God and only by His grace I am able to answer the question I have put to myself in the affirmative. I hope that you can so answer the question which I have asked you, and I have no reason to doubt that you can. God help every reader of this discussion who professes to be saved and sanctified to answer the question, "Do I have what I profess?"

Q. How can a sanctified person backslide?

A. By failing to walk in the light, or obey God. In other words, by sinning. A person backslides from entire sanctification by the same method that he falls from the grace of conversion. The temptations may be of a somewhat different type, but the

method of backsliding is the same. If you were here and read what I have written, you probably would say that I have misunderstood your question. What you mean perhaps is, How is it possible for a sanctified person to backslide? It is the establishing grace, and how can a person fall from it? Wesley thought at first that the sanctified could not backslide and finally be lost, but he changed his mind. Why? For two reasons-he got a clearer view as to what the Bible teaches on this subject, and he saw some people backslide and never get back to God. Moreover, we are on probation so long as we are in this world, it makes no difference how long we have been saved or sanctified. There is no such thing as a foolproof religion on this earth. I am told that a Cadillac car is a wonderful piece of machinery and has an unusual guarantee. It won't go to pieces on the road with reasonable driving and handling. Nevertheless, it likely will be smashed to pieces if a fellow drives it over a 300-foot precipice. No machine has a foolproof guarantee, much less a person with the power of free moral choice. But you may ask how the carnal mind, which is destroyed when a person is sanctified, can come back into the heart. You must remember that the carnal mind is a psychical-ethical state, or condition, of a person and that state can come back when the rules for its elimination are violated. The sin nature is not an evil entity, or personality; it is an evil state, or condition, of an entity, or personality. When it is eradicated, it ceases to exist, but such a state can be brought back into existence by a free moral agent when he through temptation deliberately chooses against God. Eternal security as a religious dogma for either the saved or the sanctified is a very dangerous delusion to which no Christian should give any place.

Q. Is it true that a group of Early Church men met to decide by vote which of the many Christian writings should be regarded as the Word of God? As I understand it, some books were rejected, some counted doubtful, and the twenty-seven books which now comprise the New Testament were accepted. Since all men are

prone to error, how can we be assured that their judgment was final authority?

A. To answer your question fully would require many pages. But briefly let me say that the twenty-seven books were made a part of the canon gradually according to certain principles, and then by about the end of the fourth century that canon was accepted by the Church. God didn't hand the New Testament down from heaven. But I believe that He directed the men and the Church in their selection by the Holy Spirit. The value of the New Testament across the years proves this to me. God inspired men to write these books and then He led men and finally the Church to accept the books which had been inspired.

sharing their Scriptures with those who want a copy of the Word of God—as Mary Jones wanted her copy—will be asked to have a part in a World Good Will Book, as a testimony to their love for the Bible, their faith in its teachings, and their desire to share it with others.

Throughout the world, in remote villages and giant cities, people will sign the book. Nazarene churches contributing in 1954 will be represented in the Good Will Book by the signatures of the pastor, N.Y.P.S. president, Sunday-school superintendent, and N.F.M.S. president.

To Mary Jones, sobbing before Rev. Thomas Charles, it was small comfort that a copy of the Bible was available in English. She could read only Welsh. A century and a half later, as whole nations become suddenly literate and as the art of printing explores new horizons, the goal, "To each in his own tongue," becomes a realizable accomplishment, and 1954 becomes a year of rededication.

And Jesus stood still (Matt. 20:32).

When I visited the work at Chiuta last month, our two workers asked if I would accompany them to interview the chief concerning starting fresh work. That day we held services in two villages where, I am told, the people had not previously had the gospel. On being interviewed after the services, the chief agreed to allow one of our workers to settle in that area and to conduct services. Until he has a home there he will cycle over each week to conduct services and visit the people.

This is the first year that we have had the Alabaster boxes at Tete, and the people have responded wonderfully well. This method of giving to the Lord has caught their imagination. Although they had had the boxes for only six months prior to their being opened, the amount given was four pounds, eleven shillings, nine pence. One or two had as much as ten shillings in theirs. This is sacrifice, considering that they are able to work for only about six months of each year, and their monthly wages are about one pound, ten shillings.

We are still waiting for news concerning my wife's permit to enter Portuguese East Africa. At present the application is in the hands of the authorities in Lisbon and we are trusting that the permit will be through in time for her to return with me after council.—NORMAN SALMONS, Portuguese East Africa.

Exalt Christ at Christmas

THE Christian and the Church face a tremendous propaganda barrage during the holiday season that makes it difficult to avoid the secularizing and commercializing of Christmas, the birthday of our Lord. For that reason, much planning and effort should go into the activities of Christmas time. It is easy to get into the rut of custom and habit and fail to

appropriate the Christian, evangelistic opportunities of Christmas.

Christmas in the Church

1. People are easily led to think of Christ at Christmas. The church does well to make this a time of evangelism. In spite of the "Christmas rush," a special emphasis on visitation evangelism for four weeks before ChristROY F. SMEE Secretary

mas is important. Some pastors may plan to receive new members on Christmas Sunday.

2. The Christmas program of the Sunday school is an annual institution. Simple programs that require only a few rehearsals are often more effective than elaborate ones that bring a sense of dread and frustration to many Sunday-school teachers. Group pres-

entations in settings as close as possible to actual classroom methods will help the boys and girls to share the Christmas message with a sense of reverence. This type of program, while not as humorously entertaining for the audience as "showing off" through individual recitations, has a far more helpful influence on the boys and girls. Some Sunday schools also plan an "open house" in the classrooms following the program. Others have the Christmas program on Christmas Sunday morning, planning it so that the families will also be present for the morning worship service.

- 3. Young people like to go caroling at Christmas. A little guidance will help them to plan this with a feeling of giving helpful service, rather than merely a joy ride.
- 4. The church will want to advertise Christmas Sunday services widely, and the messages need not be on the birth of Christ alone, but on His whole life and mission. Evangelism will be the pastor's purpose, helping people who come to church only a time or two a year to see their need for Christ and His salvation.
- 5. The midweek service before Christmas can be given over to singing carols and some special features such as a candlelighting service of consecration to Christian living. Emphasize family participation and advertise widely, attracting those who do not ordinarily attend.
- 6. Emphasize Christ throughout the Christmas season. A poster for the bulletin board (17 x 22 inches), with the wording, "Christmas for Christ," may be secured for 10c or six for 50c from Tidings, 1908 Grand Avenue. Nashville 5, Tennessee. Window cards (8½ x 11 inches) with the same message and the additional line, "Make This a Christian Christmas," (5c each, six for 25c) and brilliant two-color auto bumper strips with the same wording (minimum order, fifty for \$6.00) may be purchased from the same address. These are interdenominational materials.
- 7. Give opportunity for a special Christmas offering for a benevolence outside the local church. Many churches use this offering for the Nazarene Ministers Benevolent Fund.
- 8. Record the Christmas Sunday morning service or choir cantata for playing back to shut-ins.
- 9. Use the influence of the church against the advertising of alcoholic beverages for Christmas gifts and their use in office Christmas parties.

Christmas in the Home

1. Use Christian Christmas greeting cards. Perhaps you will want to order yours from the nearest branch of the Tuesday Nazarene Publishing House.

- 2. In Christmas giving, plan as family gifts (not exchange presents) those within the family's means. Plan for some gifts to those who cannot return them, perhaps in the form of kindly service rather than store-bought articles. You may want to include a gift to a missionary or home-mission pas-
- 3. Include a Christian benevolent cause in your gift list, and make this a family project.
- 4. Include the Christmas story prominently in the home Christmas decorations.
- 5. Have an evening of Christmas carols and stories with the family
- 6. Plan a family devotional service on Christmas Eve. Invite the pastor to include your home in his Christmas Eve rounds, for the reading of the Christmas scriptures.
- 7. Send Christmas tracts in letters, bill payments, etc. during the Christmas season. These are good ones: The King's Birthday, A Message for This Christmas Season, Peace: the Message of Christmas, all priced at 50c per 100 from American Tract Society, 21 W. 46th Street, New York 36, New York.
- 8. Invite a neighbor family to the Christmas worship services with you.

Monday

Take my will and make it Thine; It shall be no longer mine.

He takes it, but He still leaves the operation of it to you. And the only way to grow in grace-or to stay in grace-is to work your consecration in the details of everyday life. Not in some vague "always" your will is His, but in the very specific, bothersome present. He has given you the power to live a holy life. Use it. (Rom. 6:13-14.)

Learn to listen for the Holy Spirit. In that split second you will hear Him say: "Yes, I know this is hard, but speak gently"; "Yes, that would be clever to say, but be kind"; "Yes, you are busy, but he needs your help." In that second you can choose to be "human" or to be Christlike. (I Cor.

Wednesday

Look for the grace and take it. A girl, praying at the altar, sobbed, "The days have been so hard. There was grace, but I didn't take it. I was sorry for myself and grew bitter." In that split second when Satan says, "Pity thyself," you can choose to take the grace. It is there for you. (Rom.

Thursday

Instead of hugging a slight or an injury, turn it over to God. "Roll thy way upon the Lord." ("Cast" your care upon Him; it sounds like an act of the will.) Try it. No chance then for gloom or bitterness to accumulate, for He fills the vacuum with His peace. "How soon a smile of God can change the world!" (Ps. 37:5, margin; I Pet. 5:7.)

Are They Too Young?

How old should a child be before he is taught about Jesus?

Not long ago we were in a bookstore in Phoenix, Arizona. The owner of the store is a grandmother, and, as are most grandmothers, she was interested in her grandchildren. Her stories had to do with them. I asked her about some literature she was selling, and she began to tell me the good qualities of this book and that one. She said:

"The biggest trouble with teachers and parents of children is that they think children have to be able to read before they tell them the stories of the Bible. Anyone who teaches tiny tots should remember that she is supposed to tell the stories of the Bible when children are placed under her care. Why, a few Sundays ago I took my little two-and-one-half-year-old granddaughter to Sunday school. She went to the tiny tots' department and seemed to enjoy it a great deal. The next Sunday morning when her mother was dressing her, the little girl said, 'Mother, I want to go back to Grandmother's Sunday school.'

"Her mother was shocked and quite displeased. 'Why, Honey, you must go to your own church. That's where you belong, and you know you love it.'

"'No,' the little girl insisted, 'I don't want to go to my own.'

"'Why do you want to go to Grand-mother's church?' the mother asked.

"'Well, over at Grandmother's church they tell you all about Jesus, but at our church we just play with blocks.'"

That story left me speechless. I began to wonder if maybe many of us think that children do not know enough to hear the stories of Jesus, or at least we act as if we believe that. The Bible is full of the most interesting and wonderful stories ever written.

The grandmother of the above story also told me one of the mistakes mothers and fathers and teachers make is to get tired of telling the same stories. She said, "Children do not get tired of hearing the same story over and over."

My father was a wonderful storyteller. Nearly always before the children went to bed, he would sit down for a storytelling period. Every night he came to the place where he asked, "What do you want me to tell you?"

And always, yes, always, we asked for the same stories he had told us time and time again. The familiar stories were the best ones.

Your tiny child—do you tell him Bible stories, or do you merely let him "play with blocks"? You will find, of course, that it is much more of a task to tell interesting stories than it is to "let him play with blocks." Study to tell the Bible stories interestingly—and they will be told interestingly if you believe they are interesting!

The smart little girl didn't like to dry dishes and that story just didn't sound like the truth to her.

"Where does it say that Jesus helped His mother dry dishes?" she asked.

"Oh, right here in my book," the teacher explained.

"But I want you to show me in my Bible," and taking her Testament, which she could not read, she said, "Show me where the words are right in my own Bible."

Of course the teacher couldn't, for they were not in the Bible nor are they in any of the historical writings of Bible times. I doubt if there was much drying of dishes when Jesus was a little Boy. In the homes of kings and princes there were many dishes, but in the poor home in which Jesus lived there were probably very, very few dishes.

I have never been much of a believer in telling untruths to children. Anything I have to take back when the child reaches his teen years and asks me about it again, I believe I should never have told him in the first place.

Once when I was teaching in a public school, I had all the children make presents for their parents at Christmas time. The gifts were simple, but took lots of work for first-graders.

When Christmas was over we were gathered in the classroom. I asked one here and one there what he got for Christmas. Suddenly I became aware that a little first-grade boy was crying as if his heart would break.

"What's the matter, Myron?" I asked. "Are you sick?"

"No, but I just remembered that my daddy and mother didn't give me anything for Christmas. I gave them something," and then he burst out in tears afresh.

"Why, Myron," I asked, knowing that his parents were well-to-do, "didn't you get anything for Christmas?"

"Oh, yes, I got a wagon and a ball and bat and, oh, lots of things. But my daddy and mother didn't buy me anything."

"Well, who did give you all those things?" I asked.

"Santa Claus."

There are so many beautiful stories of Jesus: the miracles, each one; the parables; the trips Jesus took; Jesus' method in choosing His friends. The truth is beautiful! Why create doubt in the minds of the tiny folks?

God's Word to YOU

WE RIGHTLY speak of the Bible as God's Word. However, it cannot be God's Word in the truest sense unless it is God's Word to someone—to you or me.

But the Bible cannot be God's Word to any individual except as that individual meets certain conditions. God can speak to you and me only as we take the right attitude toward Him. The Bible becomes God's Word to us as we open our hearts to it.

If we are sinners, we must come to God's Word in repentance if we would hear the voice of God through it. When we delight in our sinning or even continue to make a place for it, the Bible becomes a closed Book.

Confession and repentance accompanied by a genuine spirit of humility, of poorness of spirit, must characterize the sinner if he would hear God speak as he reads the Bible. It is a wonderful Book when we come to it as we should. Then, and only then, does it really become the Book of Books.

Are we ready to be taught? Do we want the truth revealed as to what our own needs are? If so, the Bible will indeed become "quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Heb. 4:12). Thus it becomes God's Word to you and me.

The Bible is a Book about Christ; and another condition of its becoming the Word of God to us is that we must look at it through Him. Faith in Jesus Christ is essential to our understanding of the Bible. Christ is the living Word. He says: "All things are delivered unto me of my Father: and no man knoweth the Son, but the Father; neither knoweth any man the Father, save the Son, and he to whomsoever the Son will reveal him" (Matt. 11:27).

The Holy Spirit inspired those who wrote the Bible, and He is its greatest Interpreter. He is in the world to represent the Father and the Son. It is His business to make vital the truth of the Bible as it teaches us about the Father and the Son. Anyone who takes an attitude of disrespect or even of indifference toward the Holy Spirit makes it impossible for God to speak to him through the Word. As the Holy Spirit enables God the Father to speak to us about Christ through His written Word, new light is flashed on our pathway day by day; and as we walk in the light more light is given.

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (II Tim. 3:16-17).

It Was Good Dessert!

I can always find a place during a meal for dessert. It matters not how much I've eaten before, I can make room for pie, cake, ice cream,

custard, or whatever the dessert may happen to be. This time it was lemon

chiffon custard. I am especially fond of it, and I ate my share. After I had finished, I could have said, "Away with recipes, cooks, and stoves. After all, the only thing that really counts is the eating of the dessert, the actual experience that comes when one bites into, chews, and finally swallows it." I don't care a thing about dessert that I don't get a chance to actually eat; I must experience it for myself if it really is to have any value. Therefore, I say again, I could rule out recipes, cooks, fires, stoves, and everything else except just the eating of the dessert.

But before I go too far I'd better remember that this lemon chiffon pie was not only made by a good cook, but she had a recipe that she followed carefully; and she cooked the prepared dessert in an A-1 stove. I must not forget while I am thinking about the experience and its importance that it would not have been possible if there hadn't been in the mind of this cook, and before that in her recipe book, the plan for making it. Finally, then, it would be foolish—wouldn't it?—if I were to discount these other things. All of this of course moved toward the end of the experience of eating the custard; but there could not have been that experience without the plans and activities which preceded.

Why have I said all of this? In order to emphasize the fact that while in a sense the purpose toward which we are always driving in our work as preachers is to get people saved and sanctified, to get them to have certain experiences, nevertheless, there are some other things which are very important if people are going to have those experiences. Those who cook well use recipes. Some may argue with me on that point and say that the Negro cooks of an earlier day just put a little of this, and that, and the other in and achieved the end-product, which was of the best quality, without any recipe. This was not the case; they had a recipe in their minds, and had learned it from others by years of watching and working. They may not have been able to tell you exactly what their recipe was, they might not have had anything written down, but they had a recipe. All persons who cook anything that is worth eating have recipes, and those recipes are absolutely essential to the finished product.

THE SAME is true when we come into the field of religion, as I have already intimated. We want people to have certain experiences, and

Ideologies Essential

there is a sense in which that is the allimportant thing; we

must get people saved and sanctified. Nevertheless, we must remember that we cannot get people saved and sanctified without having a recipe, a philosophy, an ideology, a theology, or some basic information. I can't sanction the attitude taken by some when they say the important thing is to get the experience; it doesn't matter whether you use this or that term, or understand this or that term, just so you get the experience. It doesn't make any difference whether you have a theology, ideology, or understanding—the thing is to get the experience. The only trouble with this position is that you can't get and perpetuate the experience without some understanding, knowledge, theories, recipes, philosophies of life, ideologies, or theologies. There always has to be some thinking before there can be any worthwhile experiencing. Man is a thinking creature, and thinking opens the way for experiences; and right thinking opens the way for the right kind of experiences.

THE Christian religion has at least four very important aspects. It is a belief, first; second, an experience; third, a life; and fourth, a liturgy,

or form of worship, a way in which we actually

approach and commune with God after we have received a religious experience. These four aspects are related to one another; if we let down in one, sooner or later we'll let down in all of them. One of the strangest things is that oftentimes good people, and seemingly otherwise intelligent people, can't see this truth at all. They intimate in one way or another that it doesn't matter so much what we believe, just so we get the experience. We should also remember that when we talk about theologies, ideologies, recipes, theories, intellectual plans, ideas, or concepts of certain things, we are involved immediately in terminology. We can't have correct theology without correct terminology. Concepts, or ideas, can be expressed only in words, and right concepts can be expressed only in the proper, or certain specific, words. We not only have to have a theology, we also have to have a terminology. Letting down in our terminology means letting down in our theology, and letting down in our theology means that, sooner or later, we'll let down in our experience, our living, and our worship. All four of these aspects of our holy religion

are indissolubly bound together, and to neglect one of them is finally to neglect all of them.

During the first twenty-five years of the present century there was a striking example of the Church's failure along the line of theology. The liberal religious thinker said, "It doesn't make any difference what you believe." He discarded not only his theology but also his theological terminology, or words, and said, "Let's have the life; experience; or a varied, glamorous, and wonderful form of worship—these are the important phases of our religion. After all, theology with its specific terminology," he said, "isn't important." Thus he discarded his ideology. What happened? Communism came in with an ideology, and it has swept through the minds of millions of men. This has slowly brought the liberalist to his senses. As a result, we are now hearing more about theology and doctrine. A revival is on, and it is first of all a revival of theology.

Once again I would emphasize the fact that we can't have a proper theology without a proper We need interpretative terms, terminology. which often are not found in the Bible, to describe specifically the position which we take as to a particular line of Bible teaching. Take the deity of Jesus Christ for instance; the word deity isn't found in the Bible as applied to Christ. He is spoken of as the Son of God, but that phrase is used in different ways, even in the Bible, and certainly two people may use it with reference to Christ and not mean the same thing. Therefore, we need to say that we believe in the deity of Jesus Christ, or better still, we need to say that we believe fully the Bible teaching about Christ. It implies that He is unique, the only uncreated Son of God, or the eternal Son of God. These are theological statements of the truth as to what Jesus is; they are not Biblical descriptions of what He is. They are interpretative words, or phraseologies, which help men to state clearly and adequately their belief as to the Bible teaching about Christ.

The same is true as to the second blessing. The Bible teaching may be interpreted in various ways; in fact, it has been interpreted in various

Holiness and Terminology

ways. But as a church, we believe that the

Wesleyan, or Arminian-Wesleyan, intrepretation of the Bible teaching is correct. It is not enough for us to believe that; we must have terms which specifically and fully describe what that Arminian-Wesleyan position is. Eradication, more than any other word, is the one which the early men in the holiness movement in America used to describe their view, or their interpretation, of the Bible teaching as to the second blessing. If they used only scriptural terms, others might use those terms also but mean something different from what they meant; but those who opposed their position have not misunderstood what they meant when they used the word eradication.

This is just another illustration of the truth I am emphasizing. If we are going to have experiences like they ought to be down across the years, then we're going to have to have a theology that is what it ought to be; and if we're going to have a theology that is what it ought to be, we're going to have to have a terminology that is what it ought to be. If we are careless at any of these points, we'll suffer the consequences.

I'm for dessert; I like it, and the main thing I'm after in connection with it is to eat it, experience it. But I ought to realize that I can't have

dessert that is worth eating without proper recipes, theories,

er recipes, theories, planning, or understanding. I ought to be as wise when it comes to conversion or entire sanc-

tification. I want the experience above everything else, and I want others to get the experience; but I ought to realize that these experiences cannot be perpetuated in their true form without some attention to theories, theology, or ideology, and this cannot be kept in its place without some understanding of terminology, or better still, some right use of words.

Again, we are not in the "short run" in this business of proclaiming the gospel of full salvation; we are in the "long run." We are not working for just one generation; we are working for our generation and those who are to succeed us. This being the case, we must be sure that we maintain the proper attitude toward all the different aspects, or phases, of the Christian religion; for if we let down on one of them, sooner or later it will affect all of the others adversely.


sanctified, among them new people who were saved for the first time. Six new members were received into the church.—J. H. Livingston, Pastor.
