- 2. No manufacture of munitions is permitted.

3. No help from the United States—This in spite of the fact that industrially, commercially and politically Japan is in shambles.

General MacArthur is also making investigations of all financial affairs in Japan including banks, insurance companies and even imperial household finances.

For the second time in the history of the world, the Japanese emperor has visited the representative of another power.
